CONVENIENCE OF CARE

LivWell Community Health Services (formerly Heartland CARES, Inc.) is a non-profit organization staffed with 27 full-time employees, two contracted infectious diseases physicians, three contracted pharmacy employees and one contracted lab technician who are passionate about providing healthcare and support services to members of our community who are HIV positive. As a non-profit organization, the majority of our funding comes from grants from federal, state, and local entities.

LWCHS receives two grants from the Ryan White HIV/ AIDS Program. This is a federal initiative enacted in 1990 to provide primary medical care and social support services to low-income HIV-positive individuals who do not have health insurance or are underinsured. LWCHS receives Ryan White Part C funding for medical care and Part B funding for social support services. Our housing assistance programs are funded through various grants awarded through the Kentucky Housing Corporation. LWCHS also receives some funding through local community grants from organizations such as Community Foundation of Western Kentucky, Rotary Club of Paducah, and Ray & Kay Eckstein Charitable Trust.

LWCHS also participates in the 340B Drug Pricing Program. Pharmaceutical manufacturers who participate in the Medicaid program are required to enter into a pharmaceutical pricing agreement (PPA) with the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). In this agreement, the manufacturer agrees to provide specified discounts on certain medications purchased by covered entities who serve what is referred to as "the nation's most vulnerable patient populations". LWCHS purchases HIV medications directly from the manufacturers and our onsite pharmacy, Nashville Pharmacy Services (NPS), dispenses the discounted medications to our clients with a valid prescription from one of our two infectious diseases physicians, Dr. Carl LeBuhn or Dr. Anita Fleenor-Ford. LWCHS is then reimbursed for the full price of the discounted medications through a patient's federal government insurance such as Medicare or Medicaid or their private insurance carrier. The difference between the discounted price that LWCHS pays the manufacturer for the medication and the full amount reimbursed by insurance is retained by LWCHS as program income. Program Income accounts for more than half of LWCHS' annual operating budget. Program Income funds are administered with the same stipulations as other federal grant funding. A large portion of program income is utilized to supplement gaps in grant funding for housing,

emergency financial assistance, health insurance premiums and copays, transportation and lab fees.

LWCHS only receives 340B program income funds on scripts dispensed from NPS Pharmacy, at this time only about 50% of our 430 clients utilize NPS for their medications. According to Executive Director Donna Reeder, "While clients are free to utilize any pharmacy to receive their HIV medications, the funds reimbursed to us through the 340B program (via scripts filled at NPS) allow LWCHS to operate and provide the services that we are able to offer to all of our clients."

Nashville Pharmacy Services has been working to provide excellent customer service and support to the clients at LivWell Community Health Services for more than 12 years. Their convenient on-site location at the Paducah clinic makes it easy for clients to pick up their medications during appointments or even when attending a client event. NPS also offers delivery to clients living in Paducah and shipping to clients who live out of town. Clients who are not familiar with NPS can simply call the clinic at 270-444-8183 and schedule an appointment to meet with one of the pharmacy staff members to learn about the services provided or transferring their current scripts.

LivWell Community Health Services provides HIV specialty care and primary care services and dietician and mental health services in our clinic. Additionally, we provide housing assistance services and case management support services such as food vouchers and pantry boxes, transportation, emergency financial assistance for utilities and monthly housing costs, nutritional supplements, insurance premium and copay assistance, support for medication purchases, dental care, as well as other support services. "Having an on-site pharmacy at LWCHS is just another one of the benefits and conveniences that we offer to our clients in order to support their treatment and care," added Reeder.

INTRODUCING LIVWELL COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES



This year marks our 25th anniversary as Heartland Cares. Our history began in 1996 as a grant-funded housing assistance program providing rental assistance to people living with HIV/AIDS. Over the years we added Ryan White program services funded through the Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA) offering medical care and support services. Prevention and outreach services were added in 1999 providing free HIV testing and education. In 2012, we partnered with Nashville Pharmacy (NPS) to add an on-site pharmacy. Five years later, we opened a Prevention/Outreach Center located at 1733 Broadway Street which allowed us to expand our prevention services, enlarge our food pantry, and offer educational workshops and other activities.

As we began discussions on our last 25 years and what we imagined the future would look like, the strategic committee began planning for the next 10 years. Each department collaborated with the committee to brainstorm other services we would

hope to one day provide. It was during this time, we decided it was time to give our agency a new name that would support our long-term growth and goals. Thus, LivWell Community Health Services was birthed aligning with our new vision, mission, and values.

We will continue to provide the same services to our HIV/AIDS clients; however, the goal is to expand our reach into the community to not only provide free HIV testing, but to also offer free Hepatitis C and sexually transmitted infections (STI) testing and treatment becoming a full service STI clinic. Not only do we want to expand the scope of services we can provide to our clients, we want to expand services to the community to include other areas of sexual health. Our goal is for everyone to achieve optimal wellness in order to engage with life in a meaningful and fulfilling way. In the words of Nelson Mandela, "Action without vision is only passing time, vision without action is merely day dreaming, but vision with action can change the world." RYAN WHITE PART B FOOD PANTRY



We are excited to announce the re-opening of our Ryan White Part B Food Pantry at our Prevention and Outreach Center (1733 Broadway).

We now offer an expanded selection of items to choose from such as peanuts, raisins, and incontinence products and have increased the number of item clients can choose in each category. Clients are now allowed up to 6 meat choices, 6 vegetable choices, 6 grain choices, 3 baking choices, 3 dairy choices, 6 combination choices, 6 condiments choices and 10 hygiene choices. Qualified clients can visit the food pantry once every 30 days and pick-up in Hopkinsville is available one time per month. Clients picking

up in Paducah will be required to complete a COVID 19 check in form, have their temperature taken and wear a face mask while in the food pantry. Clients who live outside of Paducah and/ or Hopkinsville are still eligible for a food voucher each month. If you have any questions, please give us a call at (270)444-8183.



SMART RECOVERY

Our Registered Mental Health & Addictions Nurse, Tina Blevins, will be hosting a SMART Recovery Meetings every Thursday from 1:00-2:00PM for all clients who may be interested.

SMART Recovery is centered around a 4-Point Program® that helps people recover from all types of addictive behaviors, including: alcoholism, drug abuse, substance abuse, drug addiction, alcohol abuse, gambling addiction, cocaine addiction, and addiction to other substances and activities. SMART Recovery teaches self-empowerment and self-reliance, encourages individuals to recover and live satisfying lives, teaches tools and techniques for self-directed change, and advocates for the appropriate use of prescribed medications and psychological treatments.
